During a discussion on an agenda item entitled “Approve Additional Appropriations and Associated Agreements for Family COVID Assistance Grant and Small Business Assistance Grant Programs from American Rescue Plan Act Funds in the Amount of \$33,700,000,” the following exchange occurred: “[PATTI:] I have heard from dozens – I’m a business owner – I’ve heard from dozens and dozens and dozens of businesses, and this is sometimes weekly, when I talk to my customers – my employees won’t come back. That’s what they keep saying, my employees won’t come back. I’ve got work, I’m passing on it, and I’ve got big companies, saying my employees won’t come back. So that’s a concern. [DEPUTY COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR CONNIE HART:] And I hate to think that our grant is allowing them to do that for an even longer period. [PATTI:] That’s exactly my concern. They’re taking advantage of the generosity.
